#### Kia ora koutou,

#### About Attendance...

Attendance is the cornerstone of success throughout your child's schooling; laying the foundation for lifelong learning and achievement. Regular attendance enables students to actively engage and build essential skills. It allows tamariki to create and maintain friendships with peers and strong connections with teachers.

Studies demonstrate a strong link between attendance and success in learning outcomes at school. Each day missed represents a missed opportunity for learning and growth.

When students are present, they enrich classroom discussions, collaborate with peers, and contribute to school life. By contrast, when attendance is inconsistent, students are on the 'back foot' upon returning to class as they miss vital learning.

The Ministry of Education and Government emphasises the responsibility of schools and families in promoting regular attendance. By prioritising attendance, we invest in the future of our students, empowering them to reach their full potential.

We have a large group of 106 irregular attenders. These tamariki only need to attend one or two more days a term to meet expectations. So, if your child doesn't need to be at home... please send them to school. If your child is a little under the weather, and you are not sure, please send them to school. We will send them home if they are unwell. Often, once tamariki are at school and with their friends, they forget all about whatever the issue was and have a great day.

Just a thought... When you are in the workforce you are entitled to 10 days sick leave per year. If we work within that expectation

for children at school their attendance would be 95%, well above the government target!


#### KIWI

It's so often in life the little things that make a big difference.


